# Will We Ever Get Back to Church?

he 're-opening' question seems to be on everyone's minds these days. Thoughts of 'sheltering-inplace' have given way to something different. For some, they've given way to restlessness, an eagerness to push the limits and experience a sense of 'normalcy.' For others, to anxiousness, based in fear that the misbehavior of others may have life-threatening consequences to us. For others, to recklessness – and a wanton disregard for the well-being of one's neighbor. For still others, to cautiousness, grounded in the sober-minded awareness that COVID -19 still poses a significant threat to our community, our nation and our world.

While we – the people of Holy Shepherd Lutheran Church – don't want to be fearful, we do seek to be wise. While we don't want to be reckless, we do seek to be faithful. As noted last month, we are working to develop a 'reopening' strategy based upon:

- legally-binding orders from county, state and national officials.
- recommendations from our congregational insurer,
- insights from medically-trained personnel within our own congregation, and

 guidance from the CDC (Centers for Disease Control) and NIH (National Institutes of Health).

We WILL open for worship as soon as we believe it is safe to do so – but for now the answer as to "When?" continues to remain "Not yet."

At present, our county, state and national authorities are strongly advising that we DO NOT gather for corporate worship. Numerous situations wherein churches have reopened too quickly have been met with tragic and deadly consequences. Corporate singing has been shown to be dangerous. Greeting one another has been shown to be dangerous. Coffeefellowship times have been shown to be dangerous. Even the sharing of the Sacraments has been shown to be dangerous. In fact, the Centers for Disease Control has identified corporate worship as being among the riskiest behaviors one can engage in at the present time - right up there with spectator sporting events and largevenue concerts!

In order to fine-tune our re-opening strategy – we need your input. Our decisions need to account for how YOU are feeling about what feels safe to you. For instance, while some may be interested in "outdoor worship on the Preschool Playground," others may not. While some may wish to participate in a service which doesn't have singing or a liturgy or the sharing of Communion, others may not.

In either event, by completing this brief survey, we'll be better informed about what works for you, what doesn't work for you, and how we can best be church together.



### A GIFT MARKED 'FRAGILE'

Summer is in full swing.
Independence Day is just around the corner. Normally that would mean getting ready for barbeques and family gettogethers and maybe a front-



row seat at Orinda's Hometown Parade or Moraga's Fireworks Show. But this year is anything but "normal!" I suspect that this year's 4th of July celebrations are going to be smaller, less boisterous and probably less fun.

Yet it's not just COVID-19 and its attendant 'shelter-in-place' order that are going to alter our celebrations of Independence Day this year. No – the recent news of the brutal murders of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor at the hands of law enforcement personnel – and of Ahmaud Arbery at the hands of racial supremacists – and the marches and the protests which those murders spawned – have left our nation fractured and frustrated and fearful. A spirit of discontent has us firmly in its grips, and has revealed just how fragile the Union is which we share.

I can't but imagine that you have said a prayer or two for our nation amid these days. (In fact, I'd be saddened if you haven't said a prayer or two for our nation amid these days!) But what should we rightly be praying for? For many of those prayers I've seen posted online as regards our nation in recent days have been of the "My will be done" variety — rather than the "Thy will be done" sort that our Savior first taught us to pray.

In times like these – when I myself am not sure just what to pray – I find the prayers in our hymnal to be a helpful resource. And this one in particular seems to speak to the challenge of these days:

Holy Trinity, one God, you show us the splendor of diversity and the beauty of unity in your own divine life. Make us, who came from many nations with many languages, a united people that delights in our many different gifts. Defend our liberties, and give those whom we have entrusted with authority the spirit of wisdom, that there might be justice and peace in our land. We pray in the name of Jesus Christ, our sovereign and our Savior. Amen.

May God bless our fragile nation amid these days. Pastor John "Let us make human beings in our image, make them reflecting our nature." Genesis 1:26
