FOR ALL THE SAINTS

On Sunday, November 6th, we will be remembering those saints of God who have died during the past year. Sadly, our litany of saints has two recent additions.

Harry Howe passed away on Friday, October 14th, following an extended battle with bone cancer. He was a proud veteran, having served as a pilot in both WW2 and the Korean Conflict, and a proud Lutheran (one of the last original members of Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church!) A family interment service is scheduled at the VA Cemetery in Dixon. Please hold Harry's beloved wife June up in prayer!

Dorothy Anderson passed away in mid-October, as reported by her daughter Carole. Though Dorothy and her husband Ken moved out of the Bay Area a number of years ago, they still felt very connected to our Holy Shepherd community. Dorothy was both a regular reader of our pastors' sermons and an occasional online worshipper.

Important Updates from Our Church Council

President Fred Schroeder reported that — at a recent meeting of the Mount Diablo Conference — our own Pastor John Valentine was elected to serve as Dean of the Mount Diablo Conference. The Mount Diablo Conference (which is comprised of some 19 congregations in eastern Contra Costa and southern Alameda Counties) is 'the next level up' in the structure of the ELCA. Pastor John expressed a willingness to run for this position because he feels it is an important time in the life of the larger church, as we seek to resettle ourselves after some stormy times in our Synod.

Elizabeth Humphrey reported — following up on a council decision this summer to prioritize Stewardship and Children's Ministry — that our children's Sunday School program was on track to resume October 30th! For more information about this exciting development, see the article on the front page of this newsletter.

Vice-President Joan Kiekhaefer reported that there has been a VERY significant development in our congregation's Preschool. With the closure of St. Mark's Church (our Methodist near-neighbor on the other side of the Fire Station), St. Mark's thriving Preschool program is formally going out of business. St. Mark's preschool staff and preschool families have inquired about the possibility of combining forces with our preschool to create a vibrant new preschool ministry on our campus. This new preschool would be located on our campus and would serve between 50 and 70 Lamorinda families, offering both traditional preschool and full-day day care. In order to consider this substantive change to our preschool (and to authorize necessary campus alterations if approved), the Church Council called a special meeting of the congregation on Sunday, December 4th at 10:45am in the Center for Ministry.

Howard Harpham reported that our newest adult educational offering — New Testament 101 — has been very well received. Eleven enthusiastic students meet bi-weekly with Pastor John to discuss N..T. Wright's book <u>The New Testament in Its World</u>. Though the material is challenging, the conversations are worth the effort. We've even had a couple of new members get involved along the way!

Treasurer Steve Swanback reported that — while we are still a few weeks away from final fiscal year-end reports — we did close our 2021/22 Fiscal Year (ending August 31) on a good note. Our community-ministry programs (LARC and our Preschool) both ended the year 'in the black', and a shortfall in congregational receipts was more than offset by the ERC (Employee Retention Credit) funds offered by the federal government in its Pandemic Relief package. Stewardship of our congregational and individual resources will be a necessary focal point for our congregation as we move into the new fiscal year.

The Church Council has called a Special Meeting of the Congregation on Sunday, December 4th at 10:45am in the Center for Ministry to discuss the significant expansion of our Preschool program.

A WORD FROM PASTOR JOHN

"Stewardship" is one of the most important words in the whole of our Christian vocabulary, for it refers to all that we do with all that God has entrusted to us.



Stewardship. The dictionary defines "stewardship" as "the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care. Nowadays, most talk of stewardship falls into one of two camps. In the realm of government, the word 'stewardship' gets bandied about when speaking of our national and natural resources — forests and grasslands and seas and skies. In the realm of the Church, the word 'stewardship' gets bandied about as a way to talk about money — and usually refers to annual funding drives and building campaigns and offering envelopes and the like.

But at the heart of the word "stewardship" are some key assumptions. Declaring ourselves to be stewards means that:

- WE ARE MANAGERS, RATHER THAN OWNERS To say that we are 'stewards' means that we have been entrusted with taking care of something that doesn't actually belong to us. The old saying "You can't take it with you" is a pointed reminder that IT (i.e., your money and possessions) exists apart from you and that IT will be entrusted to someone else after one's death. But really that old saying is a reminder that the question is not whether we are stewards or not, but whether we are good stewards or poor ones.
- WE LIVE IN THE AWARENESS OF BOTH THE PRESENT AND THE FUTURE Good stewards don't hoard all their resources and simply attempt to amalgamate more. Neither do good stewards squander all their resources in the present without an eye on the future. Good stewards attempt to balance present realities and future realities. Jesus told a number of parables about stewardship, and he ridiculed both the prodigal son who wasted all his assets in the present and the farmer who hoarded all his assets building bigger barns and then died before he could enjoy them.
- WE ARE UNIQUELY SINGULAR YET PROFOUNDLY PLURAL As stewards entrusted with things by God, we live in the awareness that our management of God's gifts is not just for our own sakes, but for the sake of God and those whom God calls our neighbors. Our lives are NOT solos, but rather a chorus of individual voices that at its worst is a cacophony, but at its best is a beautiful symphony. Our stewardship is always "for the sake of the world".

May we live into our calling to be God's good stewards this day ... and always!
